A SECOND CHANCE

Hi my name is Hilda, and I'm a grateful recovered alcoholic. I believe with my whole being in that statement today. And let me say, that it has taken a long time to get there.

My date of sobriety is Sep 14, 1992. When I got here I was broken physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually. I had no clue what was to be in my future. I don't believe I wanted a future, because all I could even fathom was dark and void of any kind of love. But, my God had other ideas, and I was brought to the AA fellowship. I was given a sponsor who focused on the steps. I was told in order to not drink again I would have to work these steps.

So my journey began. We all have life experiences that seem only heavy and sad. It has been my experience that without those I might not be where I am today. I remember coming back into the program two days before my daughter's twelfth birthday. There were no words or feelings that I could have offered to change her world and perception. She absolutely hated me and didn't believe me -- and wasn't going to. My older daughter had married to get away from me.

I remember saying if I made it to my sixteenth anniversary of sobriety, that this then-12 year old would get my medallion because she deserved it. You see, her birthday was on the 16th.

When I reached that anniversary, I went to visit her on that birthday, her 28th, my 16th celebration of sobriety. I intended this to be her celebration. She turned it around -- she'd bought me a special, recovery medallion and put it in a wooden frame for me.

She loved me and trusted me and accepted me again. Healing is precious and in God's time. We just take the steps and live a better way, one day at a time. My feeling low was changed to feeling love because I chose to begin my journey of loving me so that I could love you.

This lovely daughter said to me then, "Mom, it's time to quit being guilty about me and my sister's life. We are grown; the choices are ours and so also the responsibility of them.

FROM THE ARCHIVES – ALMOUS CLUB

We have recently acquired the Guest book from the original Almous Club, which was located in the Morgan Hotel in 1950. The Morgan Hotel was on the southeast corner of Volusia Avenue and Palmetto Street, and was leveled and replaced by the S & S Cafeteria, which closed several years ago. The site now stands empty.

The first entry in the guest book is dated February 2, 1950 and records the opening of the new club room in the Morgan Hotel. It appears that everyone attending signed the book. There are 48 signatures, mostly from Daytona Beach with 3 from New Smyrna, 1 from Deland, and a visitor from New York City.

The pages are filled with signatures of out of town members of A.A. at special meeting nights:

- Feb. 1, 1951 was Orlando night
- Mar. 1, 1951 was Palatka night - 6 members from Palatka attended
- Mar. 4, 1951 Homer H. H. of Miami, Florida wrote, "In the room now occupied by A.A. in the hotel that started that drunk that led me to A.A. - Thank God."
- April 22, 1951 a page is devoted to the attendees at the 9th Annual Anniversary Banquet of the Daytona Beach Group.
- May 21, 1951 EauGallie night
- Sept. 12, 1951 Friendship night
- Oct. 18, 1951 Jacksonville night. There are 5 signatures from the Central Group in Jacksonville and a visitor from Memphis, TN and another from W. Palm Beach.
- April 28, 1952 is the 10th Anniversary meeting.
- Aug. 4, 1952 celebrates the new club room at 410 Magnolia St. This building is still standing and is west of Ridgewood Ave. down by the railroad tracks. The meetings were held on the second floor.

Visitors listed in these pages came from all over the United States and Canada, San Diego, California, Ft. Worth, Texas, Minneapolis, Minnesota, Montpelier, Vermont, Toronto, Ontario, Canada and one from as far away as Newfoundland. The entries continue until May 16, 1957, a testament to the fact that A.A. has been alive and thriving in Daytona Beach for more than 70 years.

Experience, Strength & Hope – Truth

How truth makes us free is something that we A.A.'s can well understand. It cut the shackles that once bound us to alcohol. It continues to release us from conflicts and miseries beyond reckoning; it banished fear and isolation. The unity of our Fellowship, the love we cherish for each other, the esteem in which the world holds us – all of these are products of the truth which, under God, we have been privileged to perceive.

Just how and when we tell the truth – or keep silent – can often reveal the difference between genuine integrity and none at all.

Step Nine emphatically cautions us against misunderstanding the truth when it states: “We made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.” Because it points up the fact that truth can be used to injure as well as to heal, this valuable principle certainly has a wide-ranging application to the problem of developing integrity.

The A.A. Tradition

Tradition One

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity.

Yet he is only one rare aspect of the problem. When we do get sober in A.A., we shed a few small bits of the Big Ego: We admit, “I can’t handle alcohol, and I can’t stay away from it on my own.” Fine so far! Then we find there is plenty of that Ego still with us. It may lead us to take other members’ inventories and to gossip about their supposed shortcomings. It may lure us into hogging the floor at every discussion meeting.

Oh well, it’s a selfish program, isn’t it? After all the miseries of active alcoholism, why shouldn’t we indulge ourselves a little? We all know one good reason why we shouldn’t: Self-indulgence of this kind is an immediate personal danger; it threatens the individual’s own sobriety. More than that, it threatens the very basis of our sobriety—the unity of the A.A. group. For a self-righteous gossip can damage the mutual trust that is vital to every group. And a compulsive talker can ruin the effectiveness of a discussion meeting—“I’ve stopped going to that group. Nobody but Joe can get a word in edgewise.”

When A.A. was very young, the first members clearly saw the preservation of its unity as a life-or-death matter for themselves and for the alcoholics still unrecovered. The First Tradition states this aim, and it is the common aim of all Twelve Traditions. When A.A. reached the age of 35, the aim was restated in the theme of the 1970 International Convention:

This we owe to A.A.’s future:
To place our common welfare first;
To keep our Fellowship united.
For on A.A. unity depend our lives,
And the lives of those to come

I was quit pleased with myself for coming up with such a quick-witted solution to cover up my tardiness. Even with my impaired judgment, I could count 3 cuckoos plus 9 cuckoos equaled 12 cuckoos!

The next morning, my husband asked me what time I got in, and confidently, I replied, "Midnight...like I promised." He didn't even raise and eyebrow and went on reading the morning paper. Phew! Got away with that one!
