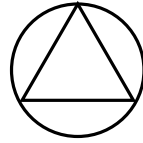

## LET GO AND LET GOD

Arriving a few minutes early for the Friday 5:00 meeting, I watched the following events unfold. There were a few other AA's already present, and the room was filled with several comfortable "pre-meeting" conversations. A newer member came barreling into the room, obviously very upset. He was a big, working man in early middle age, who had joined our group only a few weeks earlier. His shirt was drenched with sweat, and his face was red with exasperation.

Several of the group's members approached him, asking what had incited him to such an obviously troubled state of mind. He began an account of the conditions he had experienced on his way to meeting:

"The delivery truck just stopped! It was double-parked and blocking half of the street. Then the jerk in the Chrysler pulled up behind it and wouldn't pass! He wouldn't just drive around the truck! The whole street was blocked, and I couldn't move. The idiot behind me kept honking and waving his fist at me! I could see it in my rear view mirror! Honking and honking – at ME!"

Now, I could understand to an extent. It was at least 90 degrees outside, and the Friday rush hour traffic was terrible all across the city. The new man's diatribe rolled on and on, repeating slightly more excited versions of all the outrages over and over. Rather than calming down a little, it seemed as though he was continuing to get even more upset. On the other hand, I knew that the man lived only a few blocks from our group's meeting room.

After a few minutes, this new member's sponsor arrived for the meeting. An older man, he was the image of serenity as he ambled into the room. In his case, I knew that he had driven through the same stifling heat and irritating traffic, all the way across town. His old pick up had no air conditioner.

When the new member saw his sponsor entering the meeting room in such a cool, calm, collected state, he exploded. Confronting his sponsor, he angrily demanded, "Why is everything so easy for you?! How do you do it?"

Although he had missed the beginning of the new man's tirade, this seasoned AA correctly surmised what the new man had already been protesting to the rest of us. The sponsor's answer remains with me to this day. Through a peaceful smile, the sponsor said, "It's easy. I only drive my own car."

## FROM THE ARCHIVES – THE OXFORD GROUP

*What is the Oxford Group?* A pamphlet by The Layman with a notebook dedicated to [his] friend Frank Buchman. Published by Oxford Union Press in 1933.

The **Oxford Group** was a Christian organization started by an American Christian missionary Dr. Frank Buchman, a Lutheran who had become dissatisfied with the practices of modern Christianity. e founded a movement called *A First Century Christian Fellowship* in 1921 that eventually became known as the *Oxford Group* by 1931.

From the pamphlet:

**“You cannot belong to the Oxford Group. There is no membership list, location or subscription available. It is not a religion. It is a group of people who wish to lead a spiritual life guided by the Holy Spirit. The aim of this group is reawakening people to the practice and responsibilities of early Christianity.**

**The members are to keep a spiritual life by practicing the Four Absolutes:**

**Absolute Honesty, Absolute Purity, Absolute Unselfishness and Absolute Love.**

**To do this they are encouraged to engage in these four spiritual activities:**

- 1. Share sin and temptation with another Oxford Group member**
- 2. Surrender your life to God’s keeping**
- 3. Make restitution for your wrongs**
- 4. Rely on God’s Guidance.”**

The group formed house parties where there was Bible study for its influence in individual and collective needs. These groups were mixed or segregated by sex or a collection of people with like interests like clergy or professionals such as doctors or teachers.

Religious hysteria, emotionalism and neurosis were banned from meetings.

Meetings of the Oxford Group are where Bill and Dr. Bob first developed the ideas that grew into Alcoholics Anonymous. Can you see reminders of AA’s 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, and 11<sup>th</sup> Steps in the spiritual activities?

In the Back to Basics class, Wally B. emphasizes writing down God’s Guidance as part of the 11th Step work.

## Experience, strength and Hope - Selfish Program?

For many years in AA I have heard in meetings "It's a selfish program". I have always wondered where this comes from. It certainly does not come from the book "Alcoholics Anonymous" which, incidentally, is where the program is.

In "The Doctor's Opinion" page xxvi the first 100 AA's say "Though we work out our solution on the spiritual as well as an altruistic plane..." then on page xxvii Dr. Silkworth says "The unselfishness of these men as we have come to know them, the entire absence of profit motive, and their community spirit..." and then again on page xxviii "We feel, after many years of experience, that we have found nothing which has contributed more to the rehabilitation of these men than the altruistic movement now growing up among them." It is also stated on page 77 "Our real purpose is to fit ourselves to be of maximum service to God and the people about us."

None of these quotes are describing a "selfish program". In fact I have yet to find even an implication of this type of program. I believe this comment was well meaning perhaps paraphrasing page 164 "But obviously you cannot transmit something you haven't got."

But we who have recovered have a responsibility to carry the proper message to the newcomer. The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines selfish as "having or showing concern only for yourself and not for the needs or feelings of other people". Although we must work to recover ourselves before we can help others, this definition does not fit our "altruistic" program.

## The A.A. Tradition – Tradition Three

Isn't every organization entitled to have rules for membership? Why did A.A. decide to forgo this privilege, to be inclusive...never exclusive"? That's easy. Early members tried it the other way, and it just didn't work. As the fellowship was nearing its ten-year mark, the office that served as headquarters "asked the groups to list their membership rules and send them in," Bill W. recalled. "If all of these edicts had been in force everywhere at once, it would have been practically impossible for any alcoholic to have ever joined A.A. About nine-tenths of our oldest and best members could never have got by!" So the rulebooks went out the window and were replaced by one uncomplicated sentence: Tradition Three.

But, somebody may ask, isn't this Tradition itself a rule? It does state one requirement for membership. Let's read it again, and ask another question: Who determines whether or not newcomers qualify, whether they do want to stop drinking? Obviously, nobody except the newcomers themselves; everybody else simply has to take their word for it. In fact, they don't even have to say it aloud. And that's fortunate for many of us who arrived at A.A. with only a half-hearted desire to stay sober. We are alive because the A.A. road stayed open to us.

The problem faced by this Tradition isn't just past A.A. history. It keeps coming up—for instance, when a group debates whether to exclude alcoholics who have problems other than alcohol or have differing lifestyles. The Tradition mentions no such additional requirements, no demand that prospective members must not have a history of drug abuse, a certain lifestyle, or an institutional background. All alcoholics are welcome.

What about the group that seems to impose extra requirements, beyond "a desire to stop drinking"? This might be a "special interest" group or collection of groups in which, for example, each member must be a physician—or a young person, a man, a woman, a priest, or a law-enforcement officer. By their own account, those attending special interest groups consider themselves A.A. members first. They attend general-membership meetings as well as those that fill their other individual needs, and they remain devoted to A.A.'s primary purpose.

These "special interest" groups offer only one instance of the diverse and inclusive membership within our Fellowship. Our Traditions allow unparalleled freedom, not only to every A.A. member, but to every A.A. group.
